

Allergic to Hair Dye: Everything You Need to Know About PPD and PTD

If you think you may be allergic to hair dye, it's important to see a doctor or allergist for testing. A skin patch test can be done to determine if you are allergic to PPD or PTD. If you are allergic, your doctor will recommend that you avoid all products that contain these chemicals.

There are a number of PPD- and PTD-free hair dyes available on the market. You can find these dyes at most beauty supply stores and online retailers. When choosing a PPD- and PTD-free hair dye, be sure to read the label carefully to make sure that it does not contain any other ingredients that you are allergic to.

If you have a severe allergy to PPD or PTD, it's important to carry an epinephrine auto-injector (EpiPen) with you at all times. This device can be used to treat anaphylaxis, a life-threatening allergic reaction. If you think you are experiencing an allergic reaction to hair dye, call 911 immediately.

Tips for Avoiding Allergic Reactions to Hair Dye

- Do a skin patch test before using any new hair dye.
- Choose a PPD- and PTD-free hair dye.
- Read the label carefully before using any hair dye.
- Follow the instructions on the hair dye packaging carefully.

- Rinse the hair dye off thoroughly after the processing time.
- Avoid getting hair dye on your skin.
- Wear gloves when applying hair dye.
- Ventilate the area where you are applying hair dye.
- If you experience any symptoms of an allergic reaction, stop using the hair dye and rinse it off immediately.
- Call 911 if you think you are experiencing an anaphylactic reaction.

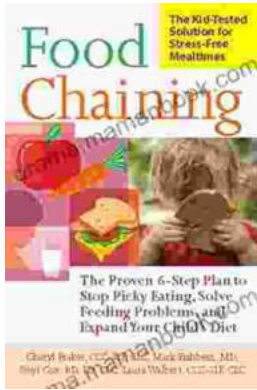


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
